Overview

Feeding Florida's Fresh Access Bucks (FAB), a USDA GusNIP grant funded program, increases the purchasing power of SNAP recipients by providing a one-to-one match for fresh produce. FAB increases access to affordable fresh produce in underserved communities while supporting Florida's farmers and enhancing local economies.




Fresh Access Bucks
